



What's New for Religious Education Students

As we enter another year of faith formation at our parishes, I am excited to share some of the new programs and events for our youth. Students in all grades will be learning more about the Bible and how to use it. New Bibles, entitled *The Catholic Children's Bible* by St. Mary's Press, have been purchased for grades 1-6 students to use in their classrooms. These are very unique Bibles as they teach children how the Bible is organized, the purpose of each book of the Bible and how to find a Bible passage. It also pulls out specific Bible stories and expands on them with pictures and discussion points. These features help students to better understand the Bible as well as see how the stories are connected over time. A special thank you to the SD CCW and an anonymous donor for covering the cost of the Bibles for the SD classrooms. These Bibles will be used each week as part of the new curriculum, *Discover!*, also by St. Mary's Press for grades 1-6. This is a very engaging program that does a great job of teaching the Catholic faith.

The middle school and high school students will also grow deeper in their knowledge of the Bible. These classes will present an 8-week, video-based Bible study program with Mark Hart. Students will get to see the big picture of salvation history presented in the Bible and learn how it impacts their daily lives. Salvation history is a term given to the overarching story of God and His creation: the creation of humanity, the fall of humanity, the covenants God makes with humanity and the redemption of humanity through Jesus Christ. Essentially, the love story between God and humanity.

Youth in both middle school and high school will also be participating in monthly *Encounter Events*. These events are held during their normal Wednesday Religious Education classes and combine SD and IC youth in grades 7-12. A couple of these events involve traveling to youth events or rallies at other parishes, but most will be led by myself at our parishes. The purpose of these events is two-fold. First, to provide an opportunity for the youth to encounter Jesus Christ at a deeper level. Secondly, to help students build a stronger faith community among their peers. Some of the topics for the *Encounter Events* include Adoration, Divine Mercy and the Four Last Things. Please also watch the bulletin and flyers for other upcoming youth events.

I want to thank everyone who works so hard to make our Religious Education program a success!

A Welcoming Spirit for Our Indian Priests

It's not just us! Many parishes in the Superior Diocese are having a change in priests this year. Bishop Powers spoke about priest assignments in the Diocese of Superior in an address he gave at the Council of Catholic Women Convention in June. According to an article by Jenny Snarski in the June 28, 2019, *Catholic Herald*, Bishop Powers stated, "'As a diocese, we are down to having 22 active diocesan priests.' He estimated that 20 years ago, there were close to 45. Clarifying that two of the 22 were Indian priest who had incardinated into the Diocese of Superior, he noted there will be 15 priests from India serving parishes this year. 'We are almost 50 percent-next year probably over 50 percent-priests from India...without (them), there is no way there would not be one-third or more of the parishes in the diocese closing.'" Bishop Powers continued, "We need to get down on our knees and thank God they are willing to come, to be with us, to minster to us, to witness to us God's love for us."

As we say farewell to Father Joseph and welcome to Father Joseph Raj Aluri, we need to continue our parishes' supportive prayers and actions during this time of transition. We can share a welcoming spirit by being patient, friendly and grateful. We need to continue providing practical services for our new priest: transportation to appointments, assistance getting his social security number and a driver's license, locating local resources – grocery stores, banks, and winter clothes. What can you do to help?

Chris Newkirk, the Diocese of Superior's Director of Ecclesial Ministries and Diocesan Consultation, was quoted in the July 11, 2019, *Catholic Herald*, "The lay faithful, as well as the many dedicated permanent deacons across the diocese, also have an important role in the life of the Church; offer your gifts in order to complement and complete those of your primary pastoral leader.' Summarizing, Newkirk said each priest has gifts to offer; the reality that each of these men has given his life to follow a common call to the priesthood, to sacrifice himself for love of God and in service to His Church, is inspiring."

Please step forward and ask how you can assist our priest and parishes of St. Dominic and Immaculate Conception during this time of change.


Bible Study Opportunities for All in our Parishes

The gratitude we express for all Christ's blessing in our lives is measures by our stewardship. While our parishes rely on the contributions of all our members, our diocese depends on our giving to the CSA to fund the over thirty critical programs, services and ministries throughout our 16 county Diocese. Just like our families and parishes have a yearly budget, so too does the diocese. It is our responsibility as members of this diocese to help them meet this budget.

We began our Parishes' Appeal August 17th & 18th, watching a video from Bishop Powers and asking all parishioners to prayerfully consider their contribution. St. Dominic's goal this year is \$20,162 and Immaculate Conception's goal is \$15,529. With approximately 105 and 85 contributing families respectively that is less than \$200 per family. We realize some families cannot afford that much, but other families can contribute more.

We ask that you help us responsibly meet our goals in this campaign by giving to the best of your ability. While you may not be aware of all the programs and services the diocese offers, rest assured that our parishes do make use of many of them. Watch the weekly bulletins for examples.
