# **Advent Reflection**

Our weekly Advent themes this year are focused on Hope - the habit of waiting with joy, patience and perseverance.

Our theme for the third week of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, is *Joyful Hope*. In Romans 12:12 St. Paul urges us to 'be joyful in hope.' When we choose to be joyful in hope, God's love flows through our lives in many ways.

Being joyful in hope means choosing faith in every situation. No matter what circumstance we encounter in today's world, we can experience joy in hope, because joy is based on our relationships with God, who offers us hope. When we choose to live in faith, we choose to live with joyful hope, looking forward to the possibilities of what God may choose to do as we trust him. Here are three key ways to live out Paul's advice about joy and hope:

- **1. Expect the best.** Expecting the best outcomes by thinking hopefully about our future leads us to joy because we're focusing our minds on the source of joy, which is God.
- **2. Pray regularly.** Communicating with God through prayer is an essential way to access both hope and joy.
- **3. Look forward to learning.** God is always at work in our lives. Joyfully anticipating what we will learn through Him helps us stay focused on the hope God offers us.

# ~~~ Encouraging a Deeper Understanding of the Gospel ~~~

On a bright Spring morning, a passerby once saw St. Francis of Assisi hoeing a row of beans and asked him, "What would you be doing right now if you knew this was

the last day of your earthly life?" The Saint responded, "I'd keep hoeing this row of beans." Preparing for this world to end whether by our death or by Jesus' glorious coming — invites us to live not in the past or the present, but deeply in the present moment.

This same point is on display in the simple advice given by the wild and eccentric John the Baptist. He speaks of the one who is to come who will baptize "with

the Holy Spirit and fire" (Luke 3:16). Despite the bizarre awesomeness of this announcement, he tells his listeners to engage in the present moment with simple acts of justice and love as their preparation for Jesus' coming, sharing their clothes and food, eliminating greedy and underhanded practices, being content with their wages.

> It's so undramatic. But how many actually did it? We don't know. How many of us will commit ourselves to these types of humble and demanding practices in our lives? That's what we should be doing now in our present moment, not worrying about the future.

> Advent challenge: Name one way you are doing the bare minimum towards others in your daily life. Or name something you are doing because you are not content with your financial situation. Pray: "Jesus, if it is

your will, help me to stop doing these things this week. Help me prepare for your coming." Then make the appropriate changes. — Father John Muir ©LPi

# **CATHOLIC QUESTIONS & ANSWERS?**

**Question:** With Christmas fast approaching, can you give me some practical tips to prepare myself and my family that will help us stay grounded in what this holiday is really about? With all the commercialism, it's easy to stray.

**Answer:** Happy times and events bring fond memories and a renewed sense of love and kinship with others. The anticipation is half the joy of the event itself. The coming of the Lord is that kind of event that people have been looking forward to for generations with fervent hope and desire. It gave them strength and courage as they waited for the coming of the Lord.

We know that Christmas is rushed. Sales begin in August and carols blare long before the season begins. Everyone laments the commercial aspects of the season, but as Advent begins, do something to help you be more mindful of the Lord's coming. Use an Advent wreath, or enthrone the Bible prominently, or read the readings from the Bible assigned to each day. Postpone the tree and decorations until closer to Christmas. Establish new family rituals, customs and prayers that help remind everyone that we are preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Fasting, daily Mass, a special celebration of reconciliation, reaching out to those alienated from family or society, and visiting the homebound manifest the love of the Christ Child and the Holy Family. Resist the temptation to rush the season. In his own time and in his own way, God will come. Our task is simply to be watchful and ready. ©LPi
